Conserving water in and around the home and workplace is the first step to saving water for Stockton's future. The City's Water Conservation Program will soon begin offering complimentary water use surveys to help customers determine how to conserve water and to most effectively keep water bills as low as possible.

INDOOR WATER SAVING TIPS

- Run dishwashers and clothes washers with full loads
- Take shorter showers
- Install low-flow faucet aerators
- Fix leaking sinks and toilets
- Install water efficient devices

OUTDOOR WATER SAVING TIPS

- Water before 11:00 a.m. and after 6:00 p.m.
- Avoid watering on rainy or windy days
- Landscape with native plants that require less water
- Dry sweep instead of hosing
- Use shut off nozzles on all hoses

SAVE WATER AND MONEY— RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL REBATES AVAILABLE

Residents and businesses may be eligible for rebates on water efficient devices.

- High Efficiency Toilets— Save up to \$100

“GREEN” GARDENING TO CONSERVE WATER AND PROTECT WATER QUALITY

Reduce stormwater pollution around your home and garden

Stormwater pollution is the leading cause of water pollution in urban areas. Using less toxic alternatives and practicing Integrated Pest Management (IPM) in the garden can help reduce stormwater pollution. Try these simple tips for a healthy garden and to protect water quality:

- Plant native plants that use less water and are more resistant to pests
- Use less toxic alternatives for pest treatment
- Use fewer fertilizers and pesticides
- Fix broken sprinklers that divert water to sidewalks and gutters
- Create nutrient-rich compost that provides a natural fertilizer
- Grasscycle (leave grass clippings on lawn)
- Set sprinkler timers to avoid excessive water runoff
- Introduce “beneficial” bugs into your garden
